

Lifetime Earnings

On average, individuals with a bachelor's degree earn approximately **\$1.2 million** more over their lifetime compared to those with only a high school diploma.

Job Projection

By 2026, about **35% of job openings** will require at least a bachelor's degree, and an additional 30% will require some college or an associate's degree.

Life Satisfaction

Individuals with higher education levels report higher levels of life satisfaction and **lower levels of stress** compared to those with less education.

INITIATIVES FOR THE FUTURE

The Michigan Hispanic Collaborative is excited about its newest initiatives which will enhance our work and expand opportunities for Hispanic communities statewide. By continuing to foster and strengthen partnerships with local businesses and educational institutions, we aim to create sustainable pathways for growth and empowerment.

Team Growth + Training

We are implementing a structured approach to staff and coach training, which includes:

- Curriculum Development
- Workshops and Seminars
- Ongoing Professional Development
- Mentorship and Peer Support
- Feedback and Evaluation
- Community Engagement

We are prioritizing community growth by expanding our team of coaches to enhance support for individuals and families. With a stronger, well-trained team, we can offer our scholars personalized support, resources, and a dedicated advocate to guide them through their journey.

New Office

This new space at Newlab, situated in the historic former Detroit Book Depository, provides a vibrant hub where we can connect with our community in-person and continue to build real relationships between coaches and scholars.



Research Fellows

Armed with vital data about the Latino community in the context of education and research, our research fellows will enable us to customize our programming and support for greater impact and effectiveness.

Pilot Expansion

We are shaping the future by expanding our pilot initiatives to the west side of the state, introducing a dedicated elective course in Wyoming, MI, that empowers scholars and promotes community growth.

Nationally, only about 1% of philanthropic dollars are directed toward Latino-led and Latino-serving organizations.

Our work is not possible without those who believe in our critical mission. Our partners and advocates continue to support our programming and growth through mentorship, professional development, career opportunities, and funding.
